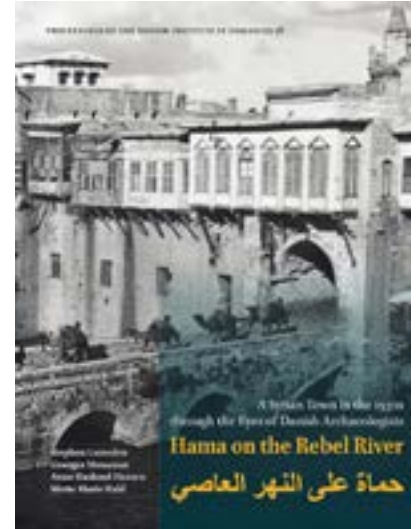
A unique depiction of Syrian Hama of the 1930s

In *Hama on the Rebel River* you will encounter the old city of Hama through the photographs, letters and paintings of a group of Danish expedition members participating in the excavation of the city's prehistoric Bronze Age remains. Hama is the fourth largest city in Syria, and in the 1930s when the Danish expedition took place it was also one of the best-preserved Ottoman Period towns in the region. Hama is well known for its huge waterwheels and aqueducts, which brought water from the river Rebel (Orontes) to buildings and gardens around the town.

However, behind the façade of this picturesque town, forces were at play to change the political and social fabric of French Mandatory Syria forever.
